Healthy Families of Sullivan is a comprehensive primary prevention program that focuses on the safety and healthy development of children while at the same time preserving supporting families. program provides in home visiting services, which are easily accessible to isolated at risk families and are respectful of cultural and community diversity. These services come at a time in a family's life when few other services are available and infants are most vulnerable. It is also the time when planned early intervention makes the greatest impact. Healthy Families of Sullivan is a comprehensive approach to meeting the health and social needs of Sullivan County newest and most vulnerable citizens, its children. Healthy Families of Sullivan was established in 2002 to serve Monticello, expanded Liberty in 2004 with the Children and Family Trust Funding, and was fully expanded in 2007 to serve all families in Sullivan County.

The program is credentialed by Healthy Families of America, receives oversight and program support from Healthy Families New York through the NYS Office of Children and Family Services, and is a voluntary program. Enrollment in program services is available to expectant families and families with newborns aged less than three months.

How can Healthy Families help new moms?

Surveys have determined that 74% of American parents wish that they had received help in learning how to take care of their newborns. The purpose of Healthy Families is to help relieve some of the stress of having a new baby while coping with other situations at the same time. Your Healthy Families Support Worker will help you to identify the hopes and dreams that you have for yourself and your family and work with you to make them come true, while helping to build strong parent-child relationships.

How can Healthy Families help me care for my baby?

Your Family Support Worker can help you to:

- Understand your baby's unique personality.
- Understand how playing with babies can actually make them smarter.
- Learn how children grow & what you can do to enhance their development.
- Understand what your baby is telling you.
- Learn about other helpful services in the community that are available to you your baby.
- Coordinate services for your child with a primary health care provider.

How much does this cost?

All Healthy Families services are provided at no charge.

Important Changes to Provider Compliance History

OCFS is preparing to start posting six-year compliance histories of licensed/registered child care programs, rather than the two-year histories that are currently posted. This will provide more information to parents seeking child care and will promote greater governmental transparency. *This change took effect May 17, 2017.*

It is not being applied retroactively. However, two-year histories that are already posted on the OCFS website may now remain

PARENTS: Visit & Ask Questions (in person & over phone)

Interested in a child care program? Make an appointment to visit! Visiting a program is the best way to judge if it will be a good fit for your child and family. We recommend visiting at least 3 programs before making a decision.

Things to keep in mind:

- · Visit during regular business hours when children are present
- Plan to stay at least an hour
- Try to bring your child to see how s/he responds to the program staff and environment
- Bring notes or a checklist to remind yourself of questions you want to ask and things you want to observe. QUALITYstarsNY has put together a checklist to help you determine whether the program is high quality. (http://qualitystarsny.org/familieschecklists.php)

Hello Friends of Child Care!

It's happening...since February 1 we have been receiving phone calls from parents that are either going to or are currently working at Resorts World Catskills. Sullivan County's economy is fast growing and we currently have only fifty-five regulated child care programs. programs have space to provide care for approximately 941 children aged six weeks to twelve years old. These programs work hard each day to provide a safe and nurturing environment so parents and caregivers can work but they cannot do it all. There are four new programs in the process of opening but we still need child care all over our County, and currently the towns of Bethel, Cochecton, Forestburgh, Fremont and Rockland there are no child care options at all. If you have ever thought about providing child care, now is the time. Call us, we can help you open a program! Sullivan County needs child care now and as our economy continues to grow we will need more child care; and not just any child care, high quality child care.

High quality child care has many components, including knowledge of appropriate early childhood development. To meet this need, the Council is offering Child Development Associate training series. Our Spring session is scheduled to begin in April 2018. The Council also offers CPR and First Aid to our child care workforce. Check out our calendar for the schedules.

Our child care work force works hard each day but we all need to keep working and looking forward in order to ensure all of our families have high quality child care options. If you, or someone you know is interested in opening their own child care program call the Council for more information.

Only topical ointments, sunscreens and repellents are legally permitted to be applied in a child care setting without a license or registration to administer medication.

416/417.5 Safety

- (f)(1) Barriers must exist to prevent children from gaining access to any swimming pool, drainage ditches, wells, ponds or other bodies of open water located on or adjacent to the property where the day care program is located. Such barriers must be of adequate height and appropriately secured to prevent children from gaining access to such areas.
 - (2) Barriers must exist to prevent children from gaining access to unsafe, dangerous or hazardous areas or devices. Such areas and devices include, but are not limited to, holes, pits, wood, pellet and coal burning stoves, fireplaces and permanently installed gas space heaters.
- (n) Materials and play equipment.
 - (1) Materials and play equipment used by the children must be sturdy and free from rough edges and sharp corners.
 - (2) Play equipment must be in good repair, and be placed in a safe location
 - (3) Play equipment must be used in a safe manner.
 - (4) Play equipment must be used specifically for its intended purpose. Such equipment and apparatus may be used only by the children for whom it is developmentally appropriate.

414/418.5 Safety

- (f) Barriers must exist to prevent children from gaining access to unsafe areas. Such areas include, but are not limited to, swimming pools, drainage ditches, wells, ponds, or other bodies of open water, holes, wood and coal burning stoves, fireplaces, pellet stoves, permanently installed gas space heaters, or any other unsafe area
- (n) Materials and play equipment.
 - (1) Materials and play equipment used by the children must be sturdy and free from rough edges and sharp corners.
 - (2) Play equipment must be installed and used in accordance with the manufacturer's specifications and instructions, be in good repair, and be placed in a safe location.
 - (3) Play equipment must be used in a safe manner.
 - (4) Play equipment and apparatus may be used only by the children for whom it is developmentally appropriate.
 - (5) All programs that substantially modify, or install new, outside play equipment must do so in accordance with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission's Public Playground Safety Handbook.

From the Desk of the Registrar

Dear Providers,

As the excitement of spring time draws near, so does the excitement of being able to play outside without the winter clothes! Grab you rain boots and spring jackets and get ready for warmer days.

Please remember to check play equipment and play areas for the dangers winter can leave behind.

- ⇒ Check to make sure any play equipment that was outside did not get cracked, broken or weaken under the elements.
- ⇒ Make sure that any play equipment or household/yard items such
 as buckets, flower pots or the like that have the capacity to collect
 water are emptied out or turned over so melting snow and spring
 showers do allow them to become safety hazards for the children.
- \Rightarrow If you plan on installing new playground equipment, refer to the manufacturers safety ground covering guidelines to remain in compliance with the regulations.
- ⇒ Don't forget to use grant money for new play equipment! Visit Voicecsea.org for more information.

Dear Jodi,

I found a playground set for free and I would like to install if for my child care program.

I am concerned about the regulatory requirements for ground surfacing under it. It is a used set so there is not product booklet that came with it. How do I make sure I have it installed correctly?

My other concern is the cost of the ground surfacing. I'm getting the play equipment for free but I'm concerned about the cost of having it installed properly.

Dear Cushioned surfaces,

If the manufacturer of the playground equipment is known, you may be able to find the guidelines on their website or obtain a copy by contacting the company.

In the case that you are unable to obtain the manufacturers guidelines you can refer to the CSPC Playground Safety guidelines, which can be found along with other playground safety tips at:

https://www.cpsc.gov/safety-education/safety-guides/playgrounds.

As for cost, you can apply for the child care grant (voicecsea.org for more information) for reimbursement for Health & Safety program needs.

You can also contact local companies, loggers, lumber companies or electrical companies who may be willing to donate wood chips.

Submit your timesheets online with the Child Care Time & Attendance (CCTA) System!

We encourage all providers to submit timesheets through the web-based system, CCTA.

There are several **benefits to using CCTA** web-based provider portal such as:

- ⇒ Eliminate the cost of shipping, mailing and purchasing paper products and postal supplies.
- ⇒ Eliminate time delay of using the postal service.
- ⇒ TRACK PAYMENTS ON A DAILY BASIS.

It is recommended to use Internet Explorer on desktops or laptops. Most iPads and other hand held tablets are not supported by this system

REMINDER – ALL timesheets have a 60 expiration date from the last date of service. ANY TIMESHEETS that are RECEIVED AFTER the 60 expiration date (electronically or paper) will be RETURNED to provider as NOT PAYABLE

NEW RENEWAL POLICY Additionally, we are modifying our renewal process. Legally Exempt News

Mandatory/Required Health & Safety for Legally Exempt Providers

You are **ONLY** exempt if you are the child/ren's:

- Grandparent or Great-grandparent,
- Sibling AND living in a separate residence
- Aunt/Uncle

There are two OCFS approved training options:

- 1. Online "e-Learning"-Foundations in Health & Safety

National Consumer Protection Week www.cpsc.gov

WASHINGTON, D.C. – National Consumer Protection Week (NCPW) is March 4-10, 2018! This week is all about keeping you safe. We're working side-by-side with federal and state partners and consumer groups to help you make informed decisions about *product safety* on five different topics:

Day #1: Baby Safety: Bare Is Best!

Nearly half of the infant crib deaths and two-thirds of bassinet deaths reported to CPSC each year are suffocations caused by placing infants to sleep on top of pillows, thick quilts and/or overcrowding in the baby's sleeping space.

Many of these deaths are preventable. Moms and dads — follow our safe sleep tips and make sure other family members and caregivers do the same.

- Always place baby on their back to sleep. This helps prevent suffocation and can reduce Sudden Infant Death Syndrome (SIDS).
- Bare is Best for babies. Do not add extra padding, pillows, blankets or other soft bedding.

Day #2: Fire Safety

Every year there are about 360,000 home fires leading to roughly 2,200 deaths. Two-thirds of all deaths occur in homes with no working smoke alarms or no smoke alarms at all. In addition, nearly 11,500 ER-treated fire injuries (pdf) are reported each year.

- Make sure you have working smoke alarms on every level of your home and inside each bedroom.
- Test the alarm once a month.
- Always stay in the kitchen when cooking. Stand by your pan!
- Create an escape plan with your family. Make sure there are two ways out of each room.

Day #3: Pool Safely

Every year more than 340 children, younger than 15, fatally drown in pools and spas. These deaths are preventable.

Pool Safely by following these simple steps to keep children safer in and around the water.

- Never leave a child unattended in or near water.
- Teach kids to stay away from pool and spa drains.
- Install proper barriers, covers and alarms on and around your pool and spa.
- Teach children how to swim.
- · Learn how to perform CPR.

Day #4: Anchor It!

CPSC is aware of numerous injuries and deaths resulting from TV and furniture tip-overs. About 60% of child tip-over fatalities involve children age two to five. To protect children against tip-over dangers:

- Anchor furniture, such as dressers, armoires and bookshelves to the wall.
- Secure TVs to the base or wall. Recycle older, unused TVs.
- Check for, and act on recalls of products that present tip-over hazards.
