#### Keep your Glitter Germs to Yourself!

Winter might be over, but if you run a daycare, a school age program or you are a parent with a daycare child, you know that cold and flu season NEVER ends. Here is a fun way to teach children about the importance of washing their hands!

#### **Objectives:**

- Students will have a concrete example as to why they should wash their hands with soap and warm water.
- Students will understand that germs are smaller than the eye can see.

#### **Materials:**

- Glitter
- Paper Towels
- Hand Lotion
- Bucket (to catch glitter)

#### Procedure:

(Be sure to find out if any students have allergies to hand lotion.)

- 1. Ask: What is a germ? How big is it? Why is it important to wash your hands?
- 2. Put a small amount of hand lotion in each student's hands. Have them rub it all over their hands.
- 3. Sprinkle, over a bucket, a small amount of glitter into each student's hands. Have them rub their hands to spread the glitter evenly.
- 4. Next, have a few kids try to get the glitter off with dry paper
- 5. Then, have a few kids try to get the glitter off with plain, cold water. After that, have a few kids use warm water, with soap, to get the glitter germs off.
- **6.** Let everyone wash his or her hands with warm, soapy water.
- 7. Bring everyone back to circle and ask, "What does the glitter represent (Germs)? What happened when you tried to get it off with just paper towels? Cold water? Warm, soapy water? Why is it important to properly wash your hands?

#### **Assessment will be informally based on the Following Criteria:**

- Students will demonstrate proper hand washing with warm, soapy water.
- Each student will understand that germs can be spread by not properly washing their hands.

#### Regional Market Rates

#### Five Important Reasons to Vaccinate Your Child

You want to do what is best for your children. You know about the importance of car seats, baby gates and other ways to keep them safe. But, did you know that one of the best ways to protect your children is to make sure they have all of their vaccinations?

# Immunizations can save your child's life.

Because of advances in medical science, your child can be protected against more diseases than ever before. Some diseases that once injured or killed thousands of children are no longer common in the U.S. primarily due to safe and effective vaccines. Polio is one example of the great impact that vaccines have had in the United States. Polio was once America's most feared disease, causing death and paralysis across the country, but thanks to vaccination the United States has been polio-free since 1979. Due to continual worldwide vaccination efforts, Afghanistan and Pakistan are the only two countries in the world that have never interrupted the spread of wild poliovirus, and only small pockets of polio still exist in these countries.

# Vaccination is very safe and effective.

Vaccines are only given to children after careful review by scientists, doctors, and healthcare professionals. Vaccine side effects are almost always mild such as redness or swelling at the site of the shot, but this is minimal compared to the pain, discomfort, and risk of injury and death from the diseases these vaccines prevent. Serious side effects following vaccination, such as severe allergic reaction, are very rare. The diseaseprevention benefits of getting vaccinated are much greater than the possible side effects for almost all children.

# Immunization protects others you care about.

Children in the U.S. still get vaccinepreventable diseases. In fact, we have seen resurgences of measles and whooping cough (pertussis) over the past few years. Currently, we are experiencing the largest measles outbreak in the United States, since measles was considered eradicated in the year 2000. This outbreak has been fueled by small pockets of our population that are vaccine hesitant, who are exposed to international travelers that have contracted the virus and brought it back into the U.S. While some babies are too young to be protected by vaccination, others may not be able to receive certain vaccinations due to severe allergies, weakened immune systems from conditions like leukemia, or other reasons. To help keep them safe, it is important that you and your children who are able to get vaccinated are fully immunized. This not only protects your family, but also helps prevent the spread of these diseases to your friends and loved ones.

# Immunizations can save your family time and money.

A child with a vaccine-preventable disease can be denied attendance at schools or daycare facilities. Some vaccine-preventable diseases can result in prolonged disabilities and can take a financial toll because of lost time at work, medical bills or long-term disability care. In contrast, getting vaccinated against these diseases is a good investment and usually covered by insurance. The Vaccines for Children program is a federally funded program that provides vaccines at no cost to children from low-income families.

# Immunization protects future generations.

Vaccines have reduced and, in some cases, eliminated many diseases that killed or severely disabled people just a few generations ago. For example, smallpox vaccination eradicated that disease worldwide. Your children don't have to get smallpox shots anymore because the disease no longer exists anywhere in the world. By vaccinating children against rubella (German measles), we have dramatically reduced the risk that pregnant women will pass this virus on to their fetus or newborn, and birth defects associated with that virus are seen in only rare cases in the United States when a pregnant woman who was never vaccinated against rubella is exposed to someone who contracted rubella in another country. If we continue vaccinating now, and vaccinating completely, parents in the future may be able to trust that some diseases of today will no longer be around to harm their children in the future.

# The Benefits of Gardening with Young Children

Do the children in your care know and understand how fruits and vegetables are grown? Do they know if they grown above the ground or under?

Have children get excited about where food comes and the miracle of a seed becoming something edible. Read a book about gardening or fruits and vegetables.

Start by planting a seed in a clear container and discussing what the plant needs to grow and thrive (sunlight, water, soil)

Let each child tend to their seed daily.

When the seed starts to grow you can use math and science skills to talk about the plants growth. (how tall, how much water)

Allow children to use their senses. What color do you think it will be? How will it taste? Will it feel soft or hard? Will it crunch when you bite it? What does it smell like?

Children that tend to be picky eaters are more prone to trying new food that they took part in growing. What dishes can we make with these foods. How do they taste raw or cooked?

Once your seed has grown relocate it to a children's garden space.

Add outdoor activities like "Yoga in the Garden". Can the children pose like a frog? Can they sit up tall like a green bean?

#### **Educational Incentive Program (EIP)**

EIP is sponsored by the NYSOCFS, funded by the federal Child Care & Development Fund and administered by the Professional Development Program (PDP), Rockefeller College, University at Albany.

# Focus on the Regulations Review Regulations @ ocfs.ny.gov

417.11(a) Health and Infection Control

- (3) The program must keep documentation of immunizations the child has received to date, in accordance with New York State Public Health Law.
- (4) Any child not yet immunized may be admitted provided the child's immunizations are in process, in accordance with the requirements of New York State Public Health Law, and the parent gives the program specific appointment dates for required immunizations.
- (5) Any child who is not immunized because of the parent's religious beliefs may be admitted if the parent furnishes the program with a written statement to this effect.
- (6) Any child who is missing one or more of the required immunizations may be admitted if a physician licensed to practice medicine furnishes the program with a written statement that such immunizations may be detrimental to the child's health.
- (7) With the exception of children meeting the criteria of section 417.11 (a)(5) or (6) children enrolled in the child day care must remain current with their immunizations in accordance with the current schedule for required immunizations established in the New York State Public Health Law.
- (8) The caregivers' children receiving care in the home must meet the health and immunization requirements of 417.11(a).
- (9) The program must try to obtain a copy of a lead screening certificate for each child under the age of six years. If the parent does not have one, the program may not exclude the child from child day care, but must give the parent information on lead poisoning and prevention, and refer the parent to the child's health care provider or the local health department for a lead blood screening test.

#### 417.11(j) Pesticide use

1) Any application of pesticides (as the term pesticide is defined in section 33-0101 of the Environmental Conservation

- Law) shall be completed in accordance with the requirements of section 390-c of the Social Services Law and sections 33-1004 and 33-1005 of the Environmental Conservation Law.
- ((2) In addition to the requirements of section 390-c of the Social Services Law, each day care facility must send a notice home with each child or otherwise provide notification to the parent of each child not less than forty-eight hours prior to the application of pesticides. Such notice must include:
- (i) the location and specific date of the application of pesticides and may include two alternate dates in the event that an outdoor application cannot be made due to weather conditions;
- (ii) the pesticide product name and pesticide registration number assigned by the United States Environmental Protection Agency:
- (iii) the following statement: "This notice is to inform you of a pending pesticide application at this facility. You may wish to discuss with a representative of the day care facility what precautions are being taken to protect your child from exposure to these pesticides. Further information about the product or products being applied, including any warnings that appear on the label of the pesticide or pesticides that are pertinent to the protection of humans, animals or the environment, can be obtained by calling the National Pesticide Information Center at 1-800-858-7378 or the New York State Department of Health Center for Environmental Health Info Line at 1-800-458-1158"; and
- (iv) the name of a representative of the day care facility and contact number for additional information.
- (3) Any day care program that fails to send the appropriate notice of pesticide application as set forth in section 417.11 (j), for a first such violation, shall be issued a written warning in lieu of penalty. For a second violation, such program shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed one hundred dollars. For any subsequent violation, such program shall be subject to a penalty not to exceed two hundred fifty dollars for each violation. No penalty may be assessed by the Commissioner without affording the registrant with notice and an opportunity for a hearing pursuant to section 413.5 of this Article.

#### Dear Lost in the paperwork,

I believe the regulation you are speaking of is 417.7 (y) This regulation does get overlooked sometimes so good eye. In answer to your question, begin your search at https://ocfs.ny.gov/main/childcare/,go to publications. Scroll down you will see "As You Think About Child Care for Your Infant/ Toddler." and other like it. These type of publications are basically a checklist for parents. There are other links to follow for provider resources on the OCFS website, and our website at https://scchildcare.com/. I would suggest putting this information in the initial interview packet. We encourage all providers to submit timesheets through the web-based system, CCTA.
