Elijah's Law

Elijah's Law will be implemented across New York State on March 14, 2020. It will place further protections in place for children with severe food allergies. The legislation will cover schools, preschools and daycares.

The bill was passed on June 17, 2019. Elijah's Law "tells early education programs in New York they must follow state food allergy guidelines and protocols to prevent, recognize and respond quickly to lifethreatening anaphylactic reactions."

The legislation for Elijah's Law was pushed after a tragic incident where a child with a severe dairy allergy was fed a grilled cheese sandwich, suffered anaphylaxis, and died. The providers failed to call 911 during the incident. The providers told the child's mother that he had an asthma attack, but did not reveal that he had eaten cheese or that they had to administer his epi-pen.

Another bill, Gio's Law, was passed on June 18, 2019 authorizing state police and firefighters to be trained on how to administer epi-pens and that they must carry them in their vehicle.

Elijah's Law can be described in three parts:

- "Access: for every daycare to be stocked with epinephrine autoinjectors.
- Education: for every adult that works in a daycare to know the signs of anaphylaxis and be able to treat children experiencing it.
- Equity: to make sure that all children in every school in every neighborhood regardless of socioeconomic conditions, culture, or class, are safe when their parents drop them off at school."

Move Sullivan

Move Sullivan - the name itself speaks to the goal of this new program from Sullivan County: to get people moving, to work, to stores, to doctor's appointments, to wherever their lives take them. A years-long effort by the Center for Workforce Development (CWD), the Division of Public Works, the County Manager's Office and the Legislature, Move Sullivan debuted August 19, 2019 and was an immediate hit. Over 200 riders stepped on Move Sullivan's two buses that week, and within three months, weekly ridership had soared as high as 800!

"Affordable public transportation has long been a need in Sullivan County," said CWD Director Laura Quigley, a key developer of the service. "Move Sullivan was specifically designed for workers – and people who want to work – who have no vehicle or transportation of their own. Getting them employed sets them on a path to success as proud citizens who can strengthen our economic and tax base, which ultimately benefits all of us."

Funded by the County and State & Federal monies, Move Sullivan is not slowing down. If legislators

approve, the program will add two County-owned buses to supplement the Rolling V-provided buses that are circulating between Monticello and Fallsburg. The 2020 County Budget also set aside \$150,000 to expand hours, routes or both in the coming months (again, subject to legislative approval).

"The only complaint we've heard about Move Sullivan thus far is that it doesn't serve this or that particular community, and we take that as evidence of how valued the service already has become," explained County Manager Josh Potosek. "We concluded a survey earlier this year that will give us guidance on how and where to expand the program, and legislators have ensured we'll have the money to begin that expansion."

Currently, Move Sullivan's two buses, operated by Rolling V, follow a circular path (each in the opposite direction) serving 17 stops in Monticello, Resorts World/Kartrite, South Fallsburg, Hurleyville, Loch



Sheldrake, Liberty, Ferndale and Harris. These locations feature the population, employment and healthcare centers of Sullivan County.

The buses run on an express (5:30 -8 a.m.) and local schedule (7:30 a.m.-5:50 p.m.) every weekday except holidays. Typical winter weather and summer storms don't stop the service, and paratransit (handicapped-accessible) pickup/drop off is available.

Best of all, riding the bus currently costs nothing! (A \$2/trip fare will be implemented this year.)

SPOTLIGHT ON NUTRITION 417.12

- (a) The family day care program must provide sufficient and nutritious snacks to children.
- (b) The program must ensure that each child in care for more than four hours a day receives a nutritious meal.
- (c) Each child in care for more than ten hours a day must receive a minimum of two nutritious meals.
- (d) Food must be prepared and stored in a safe and sanitary manner and served at appropriate intervals.
- (e) If the program does not furnish meals, there must be adequate supplemental food available in the event that no meal is provided by the parent or if the meal provided by the parent is inadequate or of inadequate nutritional value.
- (f) Programs changing their meal policy must provide adequate notice to parents.
- (g) When meals are furnished by the program, food preferences for personal, religious or medical reasons may be accommodated. If resultant meal patterns or serving sizes will not meet the child's nutritional needs, a medical statement must be obtained documenting the appropriateness of the variation.
- (h) When meals are furnished by the program, the servings must be in portions suitable for the size and age of the children in care, including infants. There must be a sufficient amount of food available to children to permit second helpings of nutritious foods.
- z) The propping of bottles is prohibited.

- (aa) Each infant and toddler must be removed from the crib, playpen or cot and held or placed in an appropriate chair for feeding.
- (ab) Children may not be placed in a crib with a bottle, food or drink.
- (ac) A caregiver or volunteer must not force or bribe a child to eat nor use food as a reward or punishment.
- (ad) Fluid milk, 100% juice and water, are the only beverages a caregiver may provide to children in the program.
- (ae) When milk is served as a beverage, low-fat or fat-free milk (1% fat or less) must be served to children two years of age or older.
- (af) When provided by the parent, beverages are not subject to the regulatory beverage standards.
- (ag) All children with dietary restrictions based on a child's medical condition or religious beliefs of the family are exempt from the regulatory beverage requirements, when instructed in writing by the parent to the program.
- (ah) The program must share information on healthy food and beverage choices and the prevention of childhood obesity with the parent.
- (ai) Individual children's food allergies must be posted in a discreet location visible only to caregivers.
- (aj) Caregivers must take steps to prevent a child's exposure to the foods to which the child is allergic.

I have a service provider who comes into my daycare to work with one of the children. Sometimes the sessions are with the other children and sometimes they're one on one in another room. Is that ok?

Dear All Seeing,

A Dear Provider Letter was sent out on 1/13/20 that addresses this situation specifically. In this letter service providers are referred to as "Itinerant service providers" The letter included the new form OCFS-5014. This document is a consent form signed by all parties and must be on-site. Please read the letter carefully as there are three options for the visit.

- Fill in the consent (5014),
- Categorize a separate space away from the daycare space, this space is not part of the day care but will be used for therapy. Session times and dates for each session for each child must be documented and will need an approved waiver from OCFS.
- 3) Have the provider sign in and sign out as a visitor and supervise the itinerant provider. If you have any further questions about this call your Licensor or Registrar, they will be happy to explain it further..

Submit your timesheets online with the Child Care Time & Attendance (CCTA) System!

We encourage all providers to submit timesheets through the web-based system, CCTA.

There are several **benefits to using CCTA** web-based provider portal such as:

- ⇒ Eliminate the cost of shipping, mailing and purchasing paper products and postal supplies.
- ⇒ Eliminate time delay of using the postal service.
- ⇒ TRACK PAYMENTS ON A DAILY BASIS.

It is recommended to use Internet Explorer on desktops or laptops. Most iPads and other hand held tablets are not supported by this system

REMINDER – ALL timesheets have a 60 expiration date from the last date of service. ANY TIMESHEETS that are RECEIVED AFTER the 60 expiration date (electronically or paper) will be RETURNED to provider as NOT PAYABLE

Best Practices for Timesheets

- Timesheets must be submitted within 60 days of the last date of service. If not received in this timeframe, they will be returned to you NOT PAYABLE.
- Please review your timesheets before submitting looking specifically to be sure you circled all the AM/PM sections, entered in the dates of every date of service, correctly entered times on the enter and exit section, signed and dated in BLUE INK, signed AFTER the last date of service on the time sheet and filled out the top portion of the form completely.
- You are responsible for making your own copies of BLANK and COMPLETED timesheets. We can make copies for you at the SCCCC for \$.50 per page.
- Your payments are more likely to be consistent if you submit your timesheets consistently on the day after the last date of service.
- You should receive your payment in the mail roughly two-three weeks after date of submission. This is an estimate. During holidays or other times of high volume, this time may be longer. If it has been more than 30 days, please call and we will look into your payment for you.

The recall: This Baby Trend recall involves four models of black Tango Mini Strollers, each with its own model number and identifiable by a canopy in Quartz Pink (Model Number ST31D09A), Sedona Gray (#ST31D10A), Jet Black (#ST31D11A), and Purest Blue (#ST31D03A). Model numbers are printed in black on a white sticker on one of the stroller's legs.

The risk: Both of the stroller's hinge joints can release and collapse under pressure, posing a fall hazard to children in the stroller.

Incidents/injuries: No injuries have been reported with this Baby Trend stroller recall.

Where and when sold: The strollers were sold in October and November 2019 for between \$100 and \$120 on Amazon.com, and at Target stores and Target.com.

The remedy: Consumers should stop using the recalled strollers and contact Baby Trend for a free replacement or full refund. The company asks consumers not to return the strollers to the retailer.
