Sun Safety

Follow these tips from the AAP to stay safe in the sun all summer long!

- Keep infants under six months out of direct sunlight by utilizing shade from umbrellas, trees or a stroller canopy.
- If shade is not available, get parents approval to put sunscreen on limited areas of the infants body such as the face.
- Dress children in cool, comfortable clothing that covers the body.
- Wear a hat with a three inch brim all the way around
- Have your child wear sunglasses with UV protection when outside
- Select clothes with a tighter weave. Hold the item up to the sun and see how much light shines through. The less, the better.
- Avoid playing in direct sun between 10am and 4pm.
- Wear the appropriate sunscreen.
- Model sun safety and make sure all of the people in your family and program do too!

OCFS Adds ACEs Training Topic

As of January 6, 2021, the Office of Children and Family Services has added adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) as required training topic.

Adverse childhood experiences are potentially traumatic experiences that occur in children aged 0-17. Children that experience ACEs are significantly more likely to experience negative outcomes later in life such as depression, anxiety, heart disease, diabetes, STDs, addiction, incarceration and many more. People with six or more ACEs died nearly 20 years sooner than those who did not experience any ACEs.

Prediction allows for prevention so knowing this information is absolutely critical when caring for children. Adverse childhood experiences do not discriminate and it has been found that they are common across all demographics.

Helping children develop resiliency and protective factors is the best way to combat the long term effects of experiencing ACEs.

The Sullivan County Childcare Council is offering free ACEs trainings that will meet the requirement for the new training topic. The ACEs trainings will be in a four part series. We are offering ACEs 101 at this time.

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Teachstone CLASS Classroom Assessment Scoring System "Prioritize what matters most– Teacher-Student Interactions"

The Sullivan County Childcare Council now has three staff members who are certified to use the Classroom Assessment Scoring System tool (CLASS) in infant rooms, toddlers rooms, preschool rooms, and family or group family programs.

The CLASS assessment tool is meant to improve the quality of teacher-child interactions in your classroom, improving the quality of the classroom as a whole. The certification process is rigorous and includes two full days of training and a reliability testing to ensure that the quality of scoring remains consistent among all CLASS observers.



The CLASS tool is backed by evidence and research. There is a separate tools for each age group, infant, toddler and preschool.

According to the CLASS manual, "the CLASS dimensions are based on developmental theory and research suggesting that interactions between young children and caregivers are a primary mechanism of child development and learning." The CLASS tool does NOT evaluate materials, environment, health and safety concerns, or curriculum. It is designed to ONLY evaluate teacher-child interactions.

Since the CLASS tool is not measuring anything else about the classroom except interactions, a wide variety of programs can be evaluated without the concern that their score is lower due to the environment or materials available.

We feel this truly gives our providers an opportunity to receive a score and feedback that will be most beneficial to them and the children.

Infant CLASS

The intense development that occurs in infancy and the primary relationships formed foster social emotional growth and shape self-perception and self regulation. These are the dimensions that are scored in the Infant CLASS:

- ♦ Relational Climate
- Teacher Sensitivity
- ♦ Facilitated Exploration
- ♦ Early Language Support

Each of these dimensions is broken down into more specific indicators that the observer is looking for during an evaluation.

Each observation cycle is 15 minutes long and can include several cycles in one score. The follow-up conversations with teachers following the scoring process can lead to rich self awareness and quality improvement specific to interactions and relationships in the classroom.

Toddler CLASS

Observing in a toddler classroom is much more challenging than observing in an infant classroom. The quality of interactions is much more complex and there is often several things going on at once. This tool is designed for use with children approximately 15-36 months old. The dimensions used for toddler and preschool CLASS are similar:

- ♦ Positive Climate
- ♦ Negative Climate
- ♦ Teacher Sensitivity
- Regard for Child Perspectives
- ♦ Behavior Guidance
- Facilitation of Learning and Development
- Quality of Feedback
- ♦ Language Modeling

Even the most experienced and educated teachers receive scores that are three or below on some of these dimensions indicating that there is value in a CLASS assessment for all.

Preschool CLASS

Using the CLASS assessment tool allows you to focus, measure and improve classroom interactions. This is key to continued academic achievement as the child continues into primary and secondary school. Identifying the strengths and weaknesses of your classroom will leave lasting effect on the children in your care. The dimensions observed in a preschool setting are:

- Positive Climate
- ♦ Negative Climate
- ♦ Teacher Sensitivity
- Regard for Students perspectives
- Behavior Management
- Productivity
- ♦ Instructional Learning Formats
- ♦ Concept Development
- Quality of Feedback
- ♦ Language Modeling

Child & Adult Care Food Program (CACFP)

Is your child care provider on the CACFP Program? If you want to know if your child's provider participates in healthy meals by CACFP OR you are a child care provider interested in getting reimbursed for healthy meals to the children in your care, call Aimee at (845) 292-7166.

New Guidance for CACFP Reimbursement Rates

Food insecurity is a real issue within our County and around the world. There are at least three school districts in Sullivan County where more than 50 percent of children are eligible for free and reduced meals at school. Children that are not enrolled in school, or are on hybrid learning schedules, are at higher risk for not getting well balanced meals or missing meals all together.

For these reasons, it is so important for childcare providers to help the children in our community remain full and nourished while in care. The Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP) can help during these most challenging times.

Many days children are eating most of their meals away from home or unattended at home. Packing nutritious meals can be difficult with limited serving resources or lack of access to a stove, refrigerator, freezer, or microwave. This is one reason healthy meals in childcare is so important.

Offering children home cooked meals is not only nutritious but children learn so much from mealtimes with their peers. They can learn manners, learn to help regulate their eating habits and try new foods from a young age. Providers who participate in the Child Adult Care Food Program alleviate the parental stress of healthy eating while in care. Providing healthy meals is a huge selling point for your program!

The guidelines are well balanced and there are many approved "child friendly meals/snacks" allowable for reimbursement.

For example:

Breakfast WG Pancakes Banana 1% milk **Snack** Animal Crackers 100 % juice Lunch
Meatballs
Spaghetti
Tomato Sauce
Apples
1 % milk

Due to the challenges of COVID and the continued increase in food costs, many children have not been receiving the benefits of being enrolled in the CACFP program. For this reason, new federal guidelines have been released, effective July 1, 2021, stating that all programs will receive Tier One rates, regardless of previous eligibility. The eligibility for Tier One will be revaluated in June 2022.

With top rates for reimbursement and programs opening back up, now is the time to join the CACFP program even if you have considered it in the past. Call me at (845) 292-7166 and I can help you get started.

SPOTLIGHT On: COVID Vaccine

417.8 Supervision of children

- (a) Children cannot be left without competent supervision at any time. Competent supervision includes awareness of and responsibility for the ongoing activity of each child. It requires that all children be within a caregiver's range of vision except as provided in section 417.8(b) of this Part and that the caregiver be near enough to respond when redirection or intervention strategies are needed. Competent supervision must take into account the child's age, emotional, physical and cognitive development. (b) Children may be outside a caregiver's range of vision only
- (1) With the prior written permission of the parent, children who are napping or sleeping may do so in a room where an awake approved caregiver is not present, the doors to all rooms must be open; the approved caregiver must remain on the same floor as the children; and a functioning electronic monitor must be used in any room where children are sleeping or napping, and an awake approved caregiver is not present.

as follows.

(2) When a functioning electronic monitor is in use, napping and sleeping children must be physically checked every 15 minutes to assess the overall safety and well-being of the children and to make sure infants' faces are uncovered. The checks must be done in close physical proximity to the child.

- (3) For evening and night care, the caregiver may sleep while children are sleeping only if functional electronic monitors are in use in each room where children are sleeping. The registrant must obtain the written permission to do so from the parent of each child receiving evening or night care in the family day care home. In the event, written permission is not obtained from all parents, the caregiver must remain awake at all times and physically check sleeping children every 15 minutes to assess the overall safety and well-being of the children and to make sure infants' faces are uncovered. The checks must be done in close physical proximity to the child.
- (4) Children who are able to toilet independently, including fastening and unfastening clothing, wiping themselves, flushing the toilet, and washing their hands, may use a bathroom on another floor for a short period of time without direct adult supervision.
- (5) With the written permission of the parents, a program may allow school-aged children to participate in activities outside of the direct supervision of a caregiver. Such activities must occur on the premises of the family day care home. A caregiver must visually check such children every 15 minutes. present at that destination to receive the child.

Dear Curious,

Your parent is partially correct. As of a new Executive Order dated 04/27/2021, individuals who have been fully vaccinated and are past the 2 week mark can remove the masks when outside, EXCEPT in crowded settings. From OCFS perspective a group of 3 or more children is considered a crowd, so for now until we hear anything further if you have more than 3 kids, you will need to wear the mask.

Child Care Time & Attendance (CCTA)

Submit your timesheets online with the Child Care Time & Attendance (CCTA) System!

We encourage all providers to submit timesheets through the web-based system, CCTA.

There are several *benefits to using CCTA* web-based provider portal such as:

- ⇒ Eliminate the cost of shipping, mailing and purchasing paper products and postal supplies.
- ⇒ Eliminate time delay of using the postal service.
- ⇒ TRACK PAYMENTS ON A DAILY BASIS.

It is recommended to use Internet Explorer on desktops or laptops. Most iPads and other hand held tablets are not supported by this system

REMINDER – ALL timesheets have a 60 expiration date from the last date of service. ANY TIMESHEETS that are RECEIVED AFTER the 60 expiration date (electronically or paper) will be RETURNED to provider as NOT PAYABLE

Legally Exempt News

Tips for Enrollment:

- -MUST have a subsidy approved family
- -MUST submit a complete enrollment packet (all boxes/ sections must be checked/filled out, even if it is N/A)
 - -Non-Relative providers MUST complete preservice training & provider certificate
 - -Non-Relative providers MUST complete a comprehensive background check
- -Relative providers ONLY include: Grandparent or Greatgrandparent, Sibling who is living in a separate residence, Aunt or Uncle
 - -To be classified as "In-Home", care **MUST** be done in the child's home, **not** the providers
 - -Enrollment process may take up to 40 days

AAP Advises Children and Teens Age 12 and Up Get the COVID-19 Vaccine

"In a new policy statement, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) recommends vaccinating all children ages 12 and older who are eligible for the federally authorized COVID-19 vaccine.

The AAP policy statement comes amid a discussion by the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) on the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine for adolescents 12 years and older. including a review of the data provided by clinical trials.

Earlier this week, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration granted an Emergency Use Authorization for use of the vaccine in the 12- to 15-year age group. Both steps were part of a long-standing, rigorous and transparent process that leads to the development of all vaccines.

Some pediatricians are administering COVID-19 vaccines within their practice, while others are coordinating with public health departments and other places to make sure their patients have access to the vaccine.

"Be sure to let your pediatrician know if your child is vaccinated somewhere other than the doctor's office so the medical record can be updated," Dr. Beers said. "Pediatricians are one of the most trusted sources of medical information for children, and we counsel families in our practices every single day. If you have any questions about the vaccine, please call us. We are here to help families navigate this new normal as safely as possible."
