#### You're expelled!

Expulsion in early childhood settings is occurring at significant rates every day. The available data is startling.

- Preschoolers are expelled at a rate of 3.2 times higher than children in grades K-12.
- Boys are expelled at a rate of 4.5 time over girls.
- Children of color are expelled at 2 times higher than Latino and white children and 5 times higher than Asian American children.

We know that expulsion practices disproportionately affect children of color, especially boys. We also know that these children are often expelled for challenging behaviors that childcare providers do not have the tools to address. Children who are being expelled are missing out on critical years of quality childcare where they can develop social emotional skills and protective relationships that could change the trajectory of their lives.

Please join us in a pledge to reduce these rates in Sullivan County. We are developing an incentive program that can act as a support system for your program to prevent expulsion of infants, toddlers and preschoolers.

If you or someone in your program is resorting to the expulsion of a toddler or preschooler, please call us so we can work together to make a difference in your program and the lives of that family and child.

The Sullivan County Child Care Council <u>is</u> officially open to the public! Normal business activity has resumed. All SCCCC staff members are fully vaccinated and still follow safety measures and precautions.

### ACES 201 Roll-Out

As of January 6, 2021, the Office of Children and Family Services has added adverse childhood experiences (ACEs) as required training topic.

Many of you have taken our ACEs 101 training that we are offering to help you meet your required training topic. ACEs 101 offers a lot of information that is difficult to digest and not many solutions for what to do about it. That is where ACEs 201 comes in.

We are proud to be able to offer you the second part in the training series, ACEs 201.

The 201 level training is available for anyone who has completed ACEs 101.

In the ACEs 201 series we will:

- Define resilience
- Compare stress behavior and misbehavior
- Practice coregulation skills
- Begin to look at a traumainformed workplace

This is an ongoing issue in our small and rural county but the COVID-19 pandemic has significantly exasperated the situation. Opening your own childcare program can feel overwhelming but we are here to help. We have a full staff that can walk you through every step of the process from requesting your application to improving the quality of your care. We can help you secure funding for things like meals and materials. We can provide you with free trainings that you need to keep your license current. If you have ever considered opening up a program in your home or at another location, please take the next step and call us! Here is how we can help:

#### Step One: www.scchildcare.com

Click on the tab that says "Become a provider". Click on the links and carefully read through the information. Visit the Office of Children and Family Services website where you can formally request an application. Overwhelmed? Call us!!

#### Step Two-Sue Sennett-Registrar

Call Sue Sennett, our Sullivan County Registrar. Depending on the type of program you are opening, she will be the one to work with you until you receive your registration. If you will be working with a licensor instead, she can still answer your questions and ease any concerns.

#### Step Three-LeeAna Santillo– Parent Counselor

LeeAna is your direct link to the parents-your customers! She will enter your information into our referral system so that you can connect with the families that work best for your location and schedule. LeeAna will help make sure your program fills up and you are able to bring in a steady source of income quickly. LeeAna is also a liaison between families who receive assistance in paying for childcare and the county. She can help you to investigate missing or late payments and prevent your families from having any lapse in coverage.

#### Step Four-Aimee Pittaluga- CACFP Coordinator and TA Specialist

Now that you have your program licensed or registered and you have families calling for enrollment, Aimee can help you to enroll in the Child and Adult Care Food Program. This program offers reimbursement for the food items you serve to your children for meals and snacks. It also helps you to make nutritious food a priority! CACFP is a great program for providers and their families.

#### Step Five: Kelsey Stoddard and Marisa Ix-D'Amato

Kelsey, the Infant Toddler Specialist and Marisa the Infant Mental Health Consultant are available to help your program be the best it can be. They can help you earn endorsements, improve relationships, prevent expulsions, improve materials, earn training hours, get new ideas for programming and much more. They are both available to support you as a new program and will continue to support you for as long as you are open.

#### Step Six- Donna Willi- Executive Director

Donna, who has been working at the Council for 21 years, can answer any and all questions you may have after speaking to all the members of our experienced and qualified staff. She provides necessary trainings like CPR/First Aid and any other trainings your licensor may request. She works hard to make sure the childcare providers in our community feel valued and supported as they care for our communities children.

#### Step Seven: Get Paid—Pamela DeMarmels

You may not reach Pam on the phone and you may not see her around the office but you can certainly appreciate her work because she processes all of the timesheets for families who receive childcare assistance and maintains our financials for things like materials we purchase for you and your CACFP reimbursements. She meticulously makes sure your income source remains steady to the best of her ability and as a new Sullivan County provider, she will be there for you too.

# You are What You Eat??

Being healthy is not just about eating healthy foods for caloric intake and dieting, it can also contribute to your mental health. Certain foods can help affect mood and attitude in a positive or negative manner.

Adding certain foods to your diet can help mental health, improve brain function and potentially fight off some cognitive diseases.

Things that help boost mental health and aid in the production of neurotransmitters are foods that contain high amounts of omega-3 fatty acids. Examples of these foods are salmon, tuna, sardines, mackerel, walnuts and flaxseed. Omega-3 fatty acids have been linked to a reduction in mental disorders like depression.

Turkey and chicken are a good choice of lean protein but also they help your body produce serotonin, which is vital in mood management, memory and also can help depression.

When choosing grain products chose whole grains. The brain needs glucose for energy and complex carbs allow the glucose to be processed more slowly, giving a steady source of energy.

Leafy greens are also important for a healthier mindset. High amounts of folic acid can counter depression and fatigue.

Foods that contain probiotics can help reduce anxiety and stress. Active cultures, found in foods like yogurt, also provide you with potassium and magnesium which help oxygen reach the brain.

Avocados, which are surprisingly classified as a fruit, can boost memory, and help protect your brain against stroke. They also contain lutein which helps brain function.

Certain food, like simple carbohydrates should be limited. Food choices like white bread, bagels and cereal can spike your blood sugar levels. Processed foods contain many artificial ingredients, nitrates, sodium and trans and saturated fats. Sugary foods and soda feel like an energy boost and then a 'sugar crash' that can leave you feeling low and empty. Fried foods are difficult on your digestive system to break down and can weaken good bacteria.

#### **SPOTLIGHT: TRAINING**

#### 417.14

(a) Before the Office issues an application for a family day care registration to a person or entity who has yet to hold an Office of Children and Family Services day care registration, that applicant must complete an Office-approved preapplication orientation session.

(b) Before the Office issues an initial registration, the applicant must complete a health and safety training course approved by the Office relating to the protection of the health and safety of children and must demonstrate basic competency with regard to health and safety standards. Such training must comply with the federal minimum health and safety pre-service training requirements. Health and safety training received prior to issuance of the registration, may be applied to the initial fifteen (15) hours of training required pursuant to section 417.14(c)(1) of this Part provided that such training was received within twelve (12) months of registration. If an applicant does not become licensed or registered within two years of successfully completing the health and safety training, the coursework must be repeated.

(1) Each applicant must complete the Office-approved training that complies with the federal minimum health and safety pre-service training requirements or three-month orientation period training requirements. This training must be obtained preservice or within three months of starting such position. Individuals who have completed Officeapproved training that complies with federal health and safety requirements may be left unsupervised with children. Any employee or volunteer who does not complete this training must not be left unsupervised with children in care until such time as the training has been completed.

(c) Each employee and volunteer must complete a minimum of thirty (30) hours of training every two years. The required (30) hours of training every two years is subject to the following conditions:

(1) Fifteen of the required thirty (30) hours of training must be obtained during the person's first six months at the program.

#### (2) A minimum of five (5) hours of Office approved training must be obtained each year which addresses topics or subject matters set forth in 417.14(f).

(f) Training must address all topics or subject matters required by state and federal law. The required state topics are:

(1) principles of childhood development, focusing on the developmental stages of the age groups for which the program provides care;

(2) nutrition and health needs of infants and children;

(3) child care program development;

(4) safety and security procedures;

(5) business record maintenance and management;

(6) child abuse and maltreatment identification and prevention;

(7) statutes and regulations pertaining to child care;

(8) statutes and regulations pertaining to child abuse and maltreatment;

(9) education and information on the identification, diagnosis and prevention of shaken baby syndrome; and

#### (10) adverse childhood experiences, focused on understanding trauma and on nurturing resiliency.

417.14

(m) All child care programs must have at least one caregiver, who holds a valid certification in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and first aid, on the premises of the child care program during the program's operating hours.

(n) CPR and first aid certifications must be appropriate to the ages of the children in care. All certifications in CPR and first aid must contain an inperson competency component.

(o) The caregiver(s) who holds the valid certification in CPR and First Aid must have their certification available for review during their working hours at the program on file.

#### Dear Jodi,

I will keep this simple. What is Elijah's Law and how does it affect me as a provider?

~Puzzled and to the point

#### Puzzled,

Elijah's Law was signed into legislation on September 13, 2019. It required the Health Commissioner to establish policies and procedures for severe allergies. The legislation was introduced in response to the preventable death of 3-year-old Elijah Silvera.

Elijah had a known severe dairy allergy, however, Elijah was given a grilled cheese sandwich in daycare. He went anaphylactic shock. Due to improper training, staff thought it was an asthma attack. His mother was not told what he had eaten and 911 was not called. Elijah succumbed and died in November 2017.

What you need to do:

1. For each child with a known (diagnosed) allergy, form OCFS-6029 must be completed

 Health Care Plans must be up-to-date to reflect changes by September 15, 2021 (contact your registrar)

Submit your timesheets online with the Child Care Time & Attendance (CCTA) System!

We encourage all providers to submit timesheets through the web-based system, CCTA.

There are several *benefits to using CCTA* web-based provider portal such as:

- $\Rightarrow$  Eliminate the cost of shipping, mailing and purchasing paper products and postal supplies.
- $\Rightarrow$  Eliminate time delay of using the postal service.
- $\Rightarrow$  TRACK PAYMENTS ON A DAILY BASIS.

It is recommended to use Internet Explorer on desktops or laptops. Most iPads and other hand held tablets are not supported by this system

\*\*REMINDER – ALL timesheets have a 60 expiration date from the last date of service. ANY TIMESHEETS that are RECEIVED AFTER the 60 expiration date (electronically or paper) will be RETURNED to provider as NOT PAYABLE\*\*

#### **Become a Legally Exempt Provider!**

Are you a parent struggling to find childcare? Do you know someone who has been struggling to find childcare? A family member or friend who is 18+ years old, can watch up to 8 children who are all related, and up to 2 children who are not related!

The family in need of care must have an open subsidy case with Department of Family Services.

Non-relative providers will need to complete a comprehensive background check and a pre-service online free training.

**Summary**: Dorel Juvenile Group (Dorel) is recalling certain Maxi-Cosi Pria 85 Convertible child seats. When the seat is installed in the forward facing position and secured to the car using the lap belt without also using the top tether, the seat may not adequately protect the child from head injury in the event of a crash. As such, these child seats fail to conform to the requirements of Federal Motor Vehicle Safety Standard (FMVSS) number 213, "Child Restraint Systems."

**Remedy:** No remedy has been established at this time. The manufacturer has not yet provided a schedule for recall notification. Owners may contact Dorel customer service at 1-877-657-9546



# **American Academy of Pediatrics Press Room**

"A new policy statement from the American Academy of Pediatrics addresses how telehealth can be used to increase patient access to high-quality, cost-efficient primary and subspecialty pediatric care, especially for those in under-resourced areas. The policy also pushes for equitable telehealth access for children and adequate payment for telehealth services.

In the policy statement, the AAP calls for:

•Health Equity: Telehealth can decrease disparities in access to care by extending pediatric expertise and best practices to children no matter where they are located.

•Access to Pediatric Care: Telehealth can expand the footprint and breadth of pediatric medical and surgical specialties by bringing expertise to remote and under-resourced areas and efficiently directing patients to the most appropriate care settings.

•Payment Reform: Payment for telehealth services at parity with the equivalent services provided in person by private insurers, Medicare, and Medicaid/CHIP, including managed care arrangements, will allow the use of the most appropriate place of service for each encounter.

•Care Within the Medical Home: Support for the use of telehealth within the medical home recognizes that the medical home offers continuity and the prudent use of health care resources, avoiding fragmented and episodic care delivered without such coordination.

•Federal Research Funding: Creation of an evidence base to address best practices, workforce needs, patient access to care, quality of care, reduction of health care costs, and patient/family and clinician satisfaction will enable future research to improve the function of and access to pediatric care via telehealth.

"Telehealth is a great option when families can't make it to a medical office because of transportation issues or out of a fear of missing too much work or because of COVID-19 concerns," Dr. Curfman said. "But we must work together to ensure that we reach everyone who needs care. Practices should set up strong telehealth systems, work with families on technological issues, and follow up to make certain patients are getting the care they need."
